Celebrating the Past, Connecting with the Present, Looking to the Future

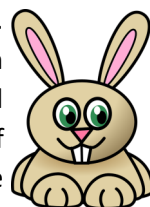
Join us, Join in!

Plans are now in place for a weekend of celebrations to mark Henderson Hall's 50th Birthday.

On **Saturday, 20th July** a range of activities will take place both inside and outside the Hall, including table-top displays with photographs and memorabilia showcasing the many user-groups - past and present, Field Sport and Games tasters, Children's entertainment, Craft demonstrations and Taiko drumming, with tea and home-made cakes served by Talybont WI.



The day starts at 11.30am with Animal Encounters, a hands-on experience with some amazing animals (great for little ones!) and finishes at the end of the afternoon with Talgarth Male Voice Choir leading a birthday singalong. There'll be a few surprises too! In addition, a grant application has been submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund and, if this is successful, the day will also feature the unveiling of a Henderson Hall 'Storyboard' and the launch of



an Oral History project; both permanent reminders of the Hall's valuable role of bringing people together and enriching community life.



Continuing the weekend celebrations, **Sunday, 21st July** begins with a Family Church Service at 11am, followed by a 'Discover Talybont' Treasure Hunt, ending at the Hall with a BBQ and live music. Posters and fliers will soon be available giving exact times and details of the weekend, so please make a note on your calendar now and then watch out for them!

A number of other celebratory events are also being organised throughout the year. Having started with a Family Foraging session led by local expert Adele



Nozedar, next on the programme is an afternoon concert, Sunday June 16th, performed by Gwent Chamber Orchestra, whose Conductor and Leader live in the village. A Charity tractor run, music and dance night, and Family Christmas play are also in the pipeline.... To help you plan ahead for the show and perhaps whet your appetite, here are some early details of events at this year's show. A change this year will be Falconry to replace the Owl displays. We also hope some craft stalls as a new venture.



The show committee are busy working up innovative new challenges including one involving 'painted rocks' – further details of this later in the summer! Something to start now is the ugliest vegetable competition, and if your carrots grow better than you had hoped, then enter them for the standard vegetable class. As in previous years, there are many other flower and veg events, so get sowing now.

The photography subjects have changed. This year children's subjects are: **My Garden** for age group: 5 – 8 years, **On the Farm** for age group: 9 – 11 years, **Colours and Patterns** for age group: 12 – 16 years, and **A Landscape** for age group: 5 - 16 years. 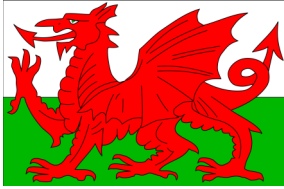

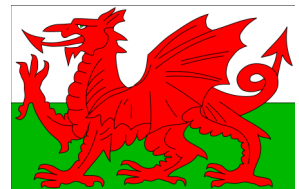

It has been an exciting and interesting year with several new ventures .We have seen the Judo club and a Drama group set up in the Hall, as well as a start up Vegan food enterprise using our kitchen on a regular basis. There are now several fitness classes -so no excuses! Summer is almost here so please get out and use what is available .The new **MUGA** playing surface (an initiative lead by the recreation group and the Community Council) will also bring more opportunities for sporting groups to be set up.

We have made a real effort this year to improve communication. A new Facebook page seems well used and we hope soon to have a public notice board .This years annual general meeting will be at 7 pm on 22nd May in the Hall. This is an open meeting which we hope will be well attended, a chance for people to pass on ideas/ comments/criticisms. Llansantffraed Church – New Boundary Wall.

The back boundary wall has been causing concern for some time due mainly to a sycamore tree having grown through the wall and pushing some of the stonework away. The stonework on other sections of the wall were loose also so we felt it was time to resolve the situation. Our local contractors, Messrs J L Stephens, commenced work in December, having firstly to arrange for the tree to be felled by professional tree surgeons, and so the date was set - but prior to the actual felling works taking place we had a bad storm which partially brought down some of the branches – whilst the Contractors were working in the area close by! A very lucky escape for Gareth and Jamie who, hearing the crack, quickly moved out of the way!! The wall which measured 16 metres in length then had to be dismantled before foundations were laid and then rebuilt using lime mortar. The job was completed on 29th March 2019 and the photo shows Gareth and Jamie standing in front of their completed build. I would like to thank Messrs J L Stephens Ltd for carrying out the work in such a professional and meticulous way, we feel it has opened up and enhanced the Henry Vaughan grave area greatly and hope that visitors to the church will sit and relax in this peaceful setting of the churchyard.

UPDATE ON THE HENRY VAUGHAN GARDEN



So what has happened since our last update in January??????

As mentioned previously the access steps and handrail were in such need of repair they were closed off and native hedging donated by The Woodland Trust arrived and was planted in March. Visitors will find it easier now to enter the garden using the existing flat path. The new plants are flourishing and a seed planting project by the Cubs will further expand the collection. The



Cubs had a fantastic evening planting seeds in yoghurt pots and using ice cream sticks as labels so we hope that they are nurturing them and will in due course plant them out in the Garden.

The Women's Institute have already made a start on weeding of the raised beds thanks to Anne and the grass has had its first cut thanks to Craig.

Still to do; 1: As the original picnic benches are past repair we hope to replace them with a recycled plastic unit, 2: Preparation of new direction signs, 3: A reprint of the Information Board is underway. 4: Permanent labels for the plants are currently

being prepared by volunteers.

We hope that with a little bit of on-going maintenance in the grass and weeding department the garden will go from strength to strength and provide a pleasant place for local residents and visitors to enjoy for years to come.

This work could not have been carried out without more than 300 hours of volunteer time, the Brecon Beacons National Park grant and generous donations from The Vaughan Society, Mandy Williams and those who provided plants.

The photo taken this week shows the peonies in bud – they were planted specifically to deter moles from the Garden – we will see if it works!!!

We hope that the planting will go from strength to strength and the garden will provide pleasure for villagers and visitors alike for many years to come.



For any new residents to the Village who may not know where the Garden is located – walk over the Canal Bridge behind the White Hart and follow the track up for about 200 yards (over a further bridge – this time over the old railway track) and you will find the Garden on your right hand side.. The steepest piece is the Canal Bridge so do persevere!!

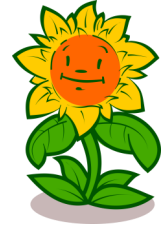

A Wild Tour Of Talybont

Friday 22nd February and I was joined by my friend Kerry, a ranger with the council. From the canal to the main path we watched Rooks gathering at their 'rookery', and Mallards, Woodpigeons, Jackdaws, House Sparrows, Siskins, Chaffinches, Wrens, Song Thrushes and Robins - most of which were busy singing away. Joining the Henry Vaughn walk we walked between the two hedgerows where along the banks, the first spring plants were appearing including Dog's Mercury, Lesser Celandines and Ramsons (Wild Garlic). More birds were singing their hearts out including Great Tits, Coal Tits, Nuthatches and Blackbirds, and a single Buzzard circled high overhead. A Great Spotted Woodpecker was drumming away ten to the dozen and Blue Tits crossed over ahead of us. A lone Jay flew down across the field and was calling loudly as it passed us.

On the Brinore Tramroad we listened to bird song and found a group of Birch Polypore fungus. A Mistle Thrush was in full fine song and after a cup of tea under an old majestic Oak we made our way onto the tarmac road which took us up to Bwlch-y-Waun. Now in open countryside the bird life changed somewhat, and soon we were watching a male Stonechat and a small group of Linnets. A Raven gave of its 'cronking' call from high overhead. Passing a line of old Alders on both sides of the road, one tree in particular had some Southern polypody ferns growing on it along with a nice clump of Pennywort.

Carpeting the tree was a host of mosses and lichens, all vying for the same nutrients from the tree, and included a little Foxglove just peeping out of the base. Moving on there was the overhead song of a Skylark and a Meadow Pipit shot past. Four Dunnocks appeared out of the Birch and Alder copse and were frantically chasing each other around. The prize moment however was as we were at eye level of the Norway Spruce plantation, and after some searching I was able to locate a pair of Common Crossbills (both females) and I was able to get a nice photo as well. At Bwlch-y-Waun a small pond had been dug out by the farmer which was being fed by natural spring water from close by. The local Frogs had already made their presence known by laying large clumps of Frog spawn - my first of the year. Already some Water Crow Foot had taken hold and insects in the form of Water Boatmen and Whirligig Beetles had also claimed their spot. The nearby stream is always worth investigating, we located some Alder nitrogen fixing nodules. Alder is particularly noted for its important and symbolic relationship with nitrogen-fixing bacterium. It is found in root nodules which can be as large as a human fist.

Soon the habitat changed again this time to open farmland, where several Stock Doves were seen and a Goldcrest was heard calling from a Pine copse. Moving onto a country lane we saw masses of Cow Parsley poking through the short grass of the banks, which contained several small Bank Vole holes and a few Rabbit burrows. A Pied Wagtail was on a nearby house roof. Finally it was time to descend down to lower ground and join the canal for the walk back to base. A group of Scarlet Elf Caps showed off their bright reds from amongst the leaf litter, and a distant Cormorant was added to the list. The canal was seeing the first of the Coltsfoot in flower. This species is quite unique in that the plant flowers before the leaves are seen, and one flower in particular had a species of Dung Fly feeding on it. A group of Long Tailed Tits flitted past, and after stopping to take a look at the 'heronry', we counted twelve nests and at least ten Grey herons in the trees. They make some strange almost prehistoric calls, and this ended a great days wildlife watching.
